How does it benefit the students? Studies show that participation in the performing arts enriches students lives in many ways.

Acting or singing on stage helps to develop quick thinking. Students learn the importance of the phrase "stay calm and carry on". Improvising becomes an important skill when a line is forgotten, a cue is missed or a plot is being developed. Students learn that imperfections (sometimes referred to as mistakes) are an opportunity to deal gracefully with the unexpected, an important lesson in every day life.

Students also become masters of their own anxiety. Performing in front of an audience is not easy. For some it can be terrifying. Learning to cope with fear is a skill students can use interviewing for jobs, giving a presentation or simply speaking up for themselves. Overcoming fear raises self-esteem, offers a feeling of success and gives students a sense of accomplishment. Students perform solos as well as learn to work together. Teamwork is a valuable lesson often used in sports. All twenty-four students, from preschool to twelfth grade, worked toward a common goal of putting on a great show. They learned that working together is rewarding and at the end of the day, hard work pays off and can be fun too.

Lastly, students learn empathy by assuming different roles or "walking in someone else's shoes". By pretending to be someone or something else, they experience different perspectives. Students can explore an array of emotions and personalities that may help them get in touch with their own feelings. The stage allows a performer freedom of expression, a liberating experience, especially when laughter and applause are the result.

The students aren't the only ones who benefit from the Winter Show. Friends, families and community members of the Big Sur south coast enjoy the evening of entertainment that has become a holiday tradition. It is a time of year when people gather together, enjoy one another's company and support the talents and hard work of our local youth and children. The show offers an opportunity for community to feel connected.
